Not bad for someone in the 8th decade of her life.

Born and raised on the South end, she attended St. Mary's for grades 1-3 then St. John the Evangelist grade school (now St. John/Holy Rosary) then Sacred Heart High School. She has one brother and one sister.

Calling herself “a late bloomer,” she entered the business world after high school and didn't feel the calling to the Religious life until her mid-twenties. Sr. Ruth Ann says that she attended Novenas, and Daily Mass, here at Holy Cross and “just felt a calling – not a voice, but something inside that said that things weren't right.” Her Confessor, Fr. Robert White, from St. Joseph Cathedral encouraged her to explore the Religious life and she eventually entered the order of St. Francis of Penance & Christian Charity, based in Stella Niagara, NY. She then became a teacher.

Those of us that were fortunate enough to have a Catholic education will most likely have fond memories of their 1st grade teacher and Sr. Ruth Ann taught those little ones for 25 years in New York, South Carolina and Ohio. In between she was a child caregiver at St. Vincent's Orphanage, here in Columbus for 6 yrs., then went to Catholic Social Services, where she worked in the senior care program into retirement at Nazareth Towers, about 13 years ago.

My memories of Christmas include children from the congregation walking up the center aisle, with one child carrying the infant Jesus to the creche. Also, children from St. Martin's Home, down the street on Rich, would sing “Away in A Manger.” The choir would sing Christmas

carols before Midnight Mass. In the early years, the Mass was in Latin, then in the mid sixties, Mass was in English and Latin. We always had several trumpets and a violin. The choir, in their robes, would come down first to receive Holy Communion, then go back to the choir loft to sing.

These are some of my memories of Holy Cross at Christmas, some forty plus years ago. My memories for the 21st century are just as good. I am sure others will have good memories twenty-five years from now, and will be celebrating 200 years of Holy Cross Parish.
